Bill Tallies:

28.8% of the Senate bills that passed the Legislature were prime sponsored by Senate Republicans

12.9% of all bills filed this year were "emergencies," meaning they are not subject to referendum

- 877 bills were filed in the House this year

- <u>HB 1564</u>: Prohibits a person from selling, offering for sale, or otherwise making available over-the-counter sexual assault kits that may be used to collect sexual assault evidence (Mosbrucker)
- <u>HB 1573:</u> B&O Exemption for fruit/veg/dairy/wine processing industry (Rule original bill was L. Wilson's <u>SB 5277</u>)
- <u>HB 1682</u>: Increases funding for preventing, investigating and prosecuting auto theft (Maycumber)
- <u>HB 1766</u>: Requires courts to develop and issue wallet sized laminated cards (Hope Cards) that contain certain information about a protection order (Griffey)
- <u>HB 1730</u>: Allows an employee 18 years of age or older to work at a 21+ establishment as long as work performed is unrelated to the sale or service or alcohol (Waters)

- <u>HB 1469:</u> The SHIELD act for abortion and gender affirming healthcare. Creates a private right of action for interference with protected health care services (Hansen)
- <u>HB 1474</u>: Adds a \$100 assessment to record a document with a county auditor (e.g. real estate transactions) to provide down payment assistance for historically marginalized communities (Taylor)
- HB 1575: Tax to fund cultural programs (Reed)

- <u>SB 5434:</u> Presumes children between ages 8 and 12 who commit murder are incapable of committing crime (Trudeau)
