

Session Bill Wrap-Up: The Good and the Bad

BILL TALLIES

- Total number of bills passed = 381
- Total number of House bills passed = 200 (52 were Republican)
- Total number of Senate bills passed = 181 (57 were Republican)
- Of those 181 Senate bills, 31.5% were Senate Republican bills

28.5% of the Senate bills that passed the Legislature were prime sponsored by Senate Republicans

- 655 bills filed in the House
- 611 bills filed in the Senate
- 1,266 total bills were filed in the Legislature this year
- 6 initiatives to the Legislature were filed
- 3 initiatives were given hearings and passed in the Legislature

INITIATIVES THAT WILL GO TO THE BALLOT

- I-2109: Rolls back the income tax on capital gains
- I-2117: Repeals the Cap and Tax mechanism in the Climate Commitment Act
- I-2124: Allows people to opt out of long-term care payroll tax

SECURE A SAFER WASHINGTON

Extreme Democrat policies and an unwillingness to address the reality of our crime and drug overdose rates puts your safety at risk. Community safety has devolved. Washington is the worst state in the nation for police staffing per capita. Violent crime, including homicides, are growing faster here than anywhere else in the U.S. People are dying in the street from fentanyl and methamphetamine overdoses. FIGHT FOR AN AFFORDABLE WASHINGTON

Democrat overregulation continues to increase the cost of everything, including home prices, rent, food, energy, and gasoline. Washington has become unaffordable for many. At the same time, the state is seeing record revenue from the taxes and fees it collects. Yet, Democrats still refuse to provide meaningful tax relief or to reform burdensome regulations.

Republicans focused efforts on killing a bill to triple the annual property tax growth rate allowable without voter approval, advocating for the repeal of the income tax on capital gains and the cap-and-tax program, fighting against a bill that will accelerate a ban on natural gas, protecting taxpayers from having to pay unemployment benefits to those who strike, and killing rent control policies that would have driven up the cost of housing/rent.

- SB 5277: Extends tax preferences for dairy, fruit and vegetable, and seafood processors (L.Wilson)

- SB 6132: Requires the Washington State Patrol and the Department of Commerce Office of Crime Victims Advocacy to submit a collaborative report on child and human trafficking crimes, trends, and trainings (McCune)
- SB 6134: Provides \$7 million for law enforcement task force to review the mapping of fatal and non-fatal opioid overdoses for recommendations for prevention (Gildon)
- SB 6160: Makes "failure to disperse" a class C felony when it is obstructing a roadway or obstructs traffic (MacEwen)
- SB 6169: Increases the potential pool of law enforcement hires by allowing active and retired law enforcement and military personnel to import certain firearms for personal use (L. Wilson)
- SB 6171: Orders a study on childcare for criminal justice personnel (L. Wilson)
- SB 6184: Makes deepfake artificial intelligence-generated pornographic material involving minors illegal (Rivers)
- SB 6204: Provides more parental and local control over K-12 school curriculum (McCune)
- SB 6205: Requires instruction on the meaning and history of the Pledge of Allegiance in public schools (McCune)
- SB 6214: Increases the seriousness of the crime of animal cruelty in the first degree (Rivers)
- SB 6215: Makes administrative and technical changes to the state tax and licensing codes (Schoesler)
- SB 6217: Deters robberies at retail establishments (McCune)
- SB 6233: Makes substantive amendments to improve the state energy code for nonresidential buildings (L. Wilson)
- SB 6235: Provides additional funding to city and county criminal justice assistance accounts (L. Wilson)
- SB 6270: Supports computer science programs in Washington grade schools (MacEwen)
- SB 6273: Requires an audit of the juvenile rehabilitation system (Boehnke)
- SB 6274: Establishes a grant program to fund school resource officers on public school campuses (Torres)
- SB 6297: Recognizes a court's authority to directly transfer a defendant from jail to an inpatient or residential drug treatment facility (Gildon)





BAD BILLS THAT PASSED

One of the worst bills to pass this session was HB 1589, which will allow Puget Sound Energy special privileges to submit plans to stop providing natural gas. The plans will only be subject to review by the Utilities and Transportation Commission, which consists of two Democrat and one Republican appointees.

- SB 5444: Limits firearms in sensitive places (Valdez)
- SB 5462: Institutes inclusive learning standards (Liias)
- SB 5778: Restricts employer speech on political and religious matters (Keiser)
- SB 5917: Expands the definition of a hate crime (Billig)
- SB 6058: Links cap-and-trade with California and Quebec (Nguyen)
- SB 6063: Removes the persistent offender label from juveniles and requires resentencing (Frame)

BAD BILLS THAT DIED

- SB 5209: Requires universal civic duty voting (Hunt)
- SB 5770: Triples the annual allowable growth rate for local property taxes (Pedersen)
- SB 5823: Changes the requirement for school bonds to pass to a simple majority (Hunt)
- SB 5832: Campaign finance/foreign influence. Targets large corporations (Amazon) and exclude them from having political influence. The bill has a House companion. (Nguyen)
- SB 5961: Establishes rent control (Trudeau)
- SB 5963: Imposes an insurance requirement for firearm owners (Kuderer)
- SB 5978: Authorizes the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) to serve as guarantor for a county that has agreed to provide a loan to a school district that is on binding conditions (Robinson)
- SB 6071: Oil exporters/human rights requires a symposium at the UW, along with a dedicated webpage with results of the symposium, identifying the human rights violations and concerns of the nations exporting oil into Washington state. (Salomon)
- SB 6136: Imposes a new tax on housing providers (Kuderer)
- SB 6191: Increases the real estate excise tax (REET) (Frame)
- SB 6304: Allows Commerce to ban the sale of tires (after market, not the ones that come on a new car) that do not meet Commerce-set energy efficiency standards. Directs Ecology, Commerce, and OSPI to set target dates for when schools would be mandated to purchase electric buses and have a fully electric fleet. Directs Ecology to enforce California's anti-idling rules for vehicles over 10,000 pounds. (Liias)
