# **Passed out of Committee**

### Good

- <u>SB 5004</u>: Adds panic buttons to the school emergency response system (Torres)
- <u>SB 5007:</u> Supporting measures to curb chronic absenteeism (Braun)
- <u>SB 5033:</u> Creates testing and reporting requirements for the Dept. of Ecology regarding biosolids (Wilson, J.)
- SB 5036: Annual reporting of state emissions data (Boehnke)
- SB 5060: Law enforcement hiring grants (Holy)
- <u>SB 5075:</u> Reducing and eliminating cost-sharing for prenatal and postnatal care (Muzzall)
- <u>SB 5079:</u> Permitting DSHS to **not** pursue overpayments to aged, blind, or disabled assistance program beneficiaries because the state was spending more on the process of collecting the overpayments than the amount collected. (Muzzall)
- <u>SB 5124:</u> Network adequacy for skilled nursing facilities (Difficult to Discharge) already passed Ways & Means (Muzall)
- SB 5165: Increases indirect compensation for damage from deer and elk (Short)
- SB 5200: Medical foster homes for veterans (Wagoner)
- <u>SB 5207:</u> Directs electronic media services to provide pro-rated refunds when a customer cancels their subscription to the service early. (MacEwen)
- SB 5229: Assisted outpatient treatment after Narcan revival (Wagoner)
- SB 5258: Addressing concurrent enrollment in Medicaid (Gildon)
- SB 5268: Unlawful possession of a firearm (Wagoner)
- <u>SB 5317:</u> Compliance between local governments and the Energy Facility Site Evaluation Council (Boehnke)

- <u>SB 5371:</u> Removes the restriction on 24-litre per transaction limit on alcohol sales to retailers (MacEwen)
- <u>SB 5399</u>: Requires LCB to make decisions on liquor license applications within 45 days; 30-day extension with good cause (Schoesler)
- <u>SB 5408:</u> Allows employers 14-day window to cure errors related to a job posting before a lawsuit (King)
- <u>SB 5499:</u> Recodifying the highly effective body scanner program at a handful of facilities operated by the Department of Corrections. (Christian)
- <u>SB 5672:</u> Improving the home-care aide certification process (Muzzall)

## **Bad**

- <u>HB 1217</u>: Rent Control -- Freezing development of new rental units, ultimately driving rents higher as demand outstrips supply. (Alvarado)
- <u>SB 5375:</u> Requiring clergy to break their clerical vows of confidentiality and be excommunicated from their churches by making them be mandatory reporters of abuse they learn of in confession. (Frame)
- <u>SB 5038:</u> Clarifying a hate crime to be an act committed "in whole or in part" because of someone's perception of another's protected status (e.g. race, color, religion) (Dhingra)
- <u>SB 5041:</u> Unemployment insurance for striking workers (Riccelli)
- <u>SB 5062</u>: Sets up a 10-person board to set standards for all childcare working conditions, including minimum wage (Saldana)
- <u>SB 5083:</u> Reference-based pricing (Robinson)
- <u>SB 5098:</u> Restricting the possession of weapons on the premises of state or local public buildings (Valdez)
- <u>SB 5133:</u> Sentencing mitigating circumstance for primary caregivers (Wilson, C.)
- SB 5181: Parents' rights -- medical notification (Wilson, C.)
- SB 5254: Trial lawyer access to patient medical records (Orwall)
- SB 5284: Extended producer responsibility in solid waste management (Lovelett)
- <u>SB 5296:</u> Revising sentencing for juvenile offenses. (Wilson, C.)
  - Creating a new court standard for certain types of offenses that requires a court make an additional finding that commitment to DCYF is necessary for public safety before a person can be sent to juvenile rehabilitation.
  - Establishing a midpoint sentence review based on the above. If a youth is not shown to be a threat to public safety, they can be released.
  - Allowing people with pending criminal charges while at DCYF to be moved to the community.
  - Expanding access to nearly every sentencing alternative for juveniles.

- <u>SB 5636:</u> Wage replace/unemployment insurance for undocumented workers (Saldana)
- <u>SB 5708:</u> Places extensive requirements on websites and apps "likely to be accessed by minors." Proponents say this is going after addictive social media sites. But who could be brought to court, and how to meet the bill's requirements, is extremely vague. Similar California bill is under injunction in the 9<sup>th</sup> Circuit. (Frame)

- <u>SB 5041</u>: Providing unemployment benefits for striking workers. (Riccelli)
- SB 5066: Law enforcement misconduct (Hansen)
- SB 5098: Weapons in certain locations (Valdez)
- <u>SB 5099</u>: Firearms dealers (Lovick)
- <u>SB 5123:</u> Adds protected classes to the nondiscrimination provisions that apply to Washington's public schools (Nobles)
- <u>SB 5179:</u> Allowing OSPI to go after schools/officials who don't comply with legislative mandates. (Wilson, C.)
- <u>SB 5205:</u> Unconstitutional bill violating freedom of religion by targeting the hiring practices of private, faith-based universities. (Conway)
- <u>SB 5266</u> "Youth Hope Act" Eliminating the 20-yr waiting period for individuals sentenced as juveniles to petition for release, even when convicted of violent crimes. (Frame)
- <u>SB 5321</u>: Providing the abortion pill to students at public higher education institutions. (Nobles)
- <u>SB 5382:</u> The "Initiative Killer" Threatening signature gatherers for initiatives with fines and jail time if certain requirements aren't met. (Valdez)
- SB 5584: Independent prosecutor (Dhingra)
- <u>SB 5726/HB 1921</u>: Taxing every mile driven at 2.6 cents, and taxing that total by an additional 10%. The 2.6 cents per mile is supposed to go to cover road maintenance while the additional 10% goes to pay for public transportation.
- SJR 8200/ SB 5186: Have to pass together.
  - 8200: Increasing property taxes by removing 60% vote needed for school bonds and lowering it to a simple majority (94% con testimony in committee) (Cortes)
  - o <u>5186:</u> Removes school facilities for which impact fees may be collected, lowering the threshold to 50%. (Krishnadasan)
